

DECEMBER 1ST ~ THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT



Reflection ~ Baruch 5: 1-9, Ps 126: 1-6, Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11, Luke 3: 1-6

As we get older, we realize that in the span of years, we have experienced more than we shall witness in the future. Just as the days grow shorter in the wane of the year, our time on this earth grows shorter. For those of us of a more select vintage, we may only have a dozen more Christmases, while our visits to the beach may be counted on the fingers of one hand. And while we may still be capable of achievement, it will no longer be measured in terms of decades, but more likely in the span of a few years, or even just a few seasons. For better or worse, our legacy has largely been demarcated, and our dreams are something that will likely be realized in the lives of our children and grandchildren, dreams not according to our design, but to their own aspirations as they continue their journey, making their mark in the prime of their lives. We have become trapped in a web of our previous decisions. We may have the ability to change in some ways, but can be limited due to physical limitations, ingrained behavior, habits, and customs accumu-

lated in our years of experience, and even the expectations of those around us. Our thoughts are turned more to fulfillment, rather than to the creation of new things. We may experience genuine insight from time to time, but that possibility is tempered by glowing embers of our mortality, until at last, we enter the next phase of our existence.

There is more to our lives than just our brief time on this planet. God created us not merely for physical existence, but rather for everlasting life, if we but turn to him and offer ourselves as beings made in his own image. While God exists outside of human time, we are limited simply to the present, even with the memories of our past or with our eyes focused on the future. God promises renewal, redemption, and eternal salvation. Just as Jesus came to this earth in the form of a child some two-thousand years ago, he is present with us each time we celebrate the Sacred Liturgy and partake of the Holy Eucharist. It is the eternal promise, the new covenant that sustains and refreshes us until that time when Christ will come again. With eternal promise comes eternal hope, the hope that will sustain us, no matter whether we are in the autumn of our temporal existence or in the flower of our youth. It is that hope that renews us, that infuses us with passion and enthusiasm, causing us to transcend our earthly limitations as we put our trust in him.

Today, we begin the Season of Advent, which begins the new Liturgical Year. It is a time of renewal, a time of prayer, a time of reflection, a time of preparation, and a time of anticipation for the celebration of the coming of Christ, Our Lord and Savior, both in history and at the end of time. Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, later to become Pope Benedict XVI once said:

"Advent's intention is to awaken the most profound and basic emotional memory within us, namely, the memory of the God who became a child. This is a healing memory; it brings hope. The purpose of the Church's year is continually to rehearse her great history of memories, to awaken the heart's memory so that it can discern the star of hope."

As the Wise Men once followed the star to bear witness to the Christ child, we too can follow the star of hope throughout the year, the great gift that is realized in the redemption of mankind.

Advent, like Christmas, has a few traditions which help us to understand and enter the significance of the season. In this reflection, we will focus on the lighting of the Advent Wreath, both in our homes, or in the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy. The Advent Wreath is a symbol of the anticipation and hope of the world for the coming of Our Lord and Savior at the end of time, as well as a reminder of Jesus' coming into the world in history. Each wreath has four candles, three purple candles and one rose-colored candle (although four white candles may occasionally be used). Purple (also prominent in Lent) signifies the preparatory or penitential nature of the Advent Season. The faithful are encouraged to pray, atone for their sins, and offer good works to prepare their hearts for the celebration of Christmas. The rose-colored candle, lit on Gaudete Sunday (which means "joy"), reminds us that the Solemnity of the Nativity is drawing near (Advent is halfway over as we journey to Christmas. Candles are lit progressively each week as a sign of expectation and for Christ's first coming into the world, as well as the anticipation of the Lord's coming for the final judgment at the end of time. We will explore other traditions in the coming weeks.

Reflection Cond.

Promise is the great theme of Advent. In the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah, we hear the voice of God, saying: "The days are coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah." In today's reading from the Gospel of Luke, the focus is not on Christmas, but rather on the second coming of Our Lord at the end of time. Jesus promised signs and while we know neither the day nor the hour, throughout history the faithful have anticipated the coming of Christ. Jesus encourages them not to fear: "There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on earth nations will be in dismay, perplexed by the roaring of the sea and the waves . . . And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand. Those who persist in prayer, and live life according to the Gospel message have nothing to fear.

As we begin this season of liturgical renewal, let us always remember that Christ is ever near to us. He is the fulfillment of promise, past, present, and future. Christ is with us, now and forever.




EXCITING NEWS FOR FAMILY SUNDAY! CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD (CLOW)
