

FEBRUARY 18TH ~ FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT



Reflection on the Sunday Readings February 18, 2024 – First Sunday of Lent Genesis 9: 8-15 Psalm 25: 4-9 1 Peter 3: 18-22 Mark 1: 12-15

Today is the First Sunday of Lent. The Season of Lent is the main penitential season in the liturgical year and commemorates the forty days that Jesus spent in the desert devoting himself to fasting and prayer. The Forty Days of Lent began just a few days ago with Ash Wednesday (observed with the placing of ashes on our forehead, reminding us of our mortality and calling us to repentance) and ends with the celebration of the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil). Visually, Lent is observed by the lack of flowers or other decorations in the church and the wearing of purple vestments by the priest and deacon at mass (except for the Fourth Sunday of Lent, when rose colored vestments may be worn). The Sunday liturgies are also marked by a greater simplicity: The Gloria is neither said nor sung, and the traditional *Alleluia* at the Gospel Acclamation is replaced by

the less celebratory, *Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory*. The Gospel readings in particular focus on the life and ministry of Jesus as the fulfillment of messianic prophecy as he journeys to Jerusalem and his Paschal Sacrifice.

"The Spirit drove Jesus out into the desert, and he remained in the desert for forty days, tempted by Satan. He was among wild beasts, and the angels ministered to him. After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God," 'This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent and believe in the gospel."

Today's reading from the Gospel of Mark is one of the briefest of all in the lectionary; yet, in the evangelist's direct style, it recounts two of the most significant events in the life of Our Lord: Jesus' temptation in the desert, and his proclamation of the kingdom of God. With these two connected events, Jesus begins his public ministry, ushering in a new era in the life of humanity. In Christ, the prophecies have been fulfilled; he is the realization of the promise made by God in fidelity to his loving covenant with man. The coming of the Savior in the person of Jesus is prefigured in the reading from Genesis, whereby God established his covenant with Noah and his descendants. As we heard in the first Letter of Saint Peter: *Beloved: Christ suffered for sins once, the righteous for the sake of the unrighteous, that he might lead you to God. Put to death in the flesh, he was brought to life in the Spirit."*

As the Season of Lent is a time of penance and solemn preparation for the joyful celebration of Easter, it is marked by days of fasting and abstinence from meat (Ash Wednesday and Good Friday), and abstinence on all other Fridays. Traditionally, Catholics refrain from indulging in certain pleasures or participate in additional acts of prayer, service, and charity as part of their preparation for Easter. One particular way to enter more fully into the spirit of Lent is to participate in the *Stations of the Cross*, held in our parish at 7:00pm each Friday during Lent. The *Stations*, a traditional Lenten devotion, are in essence a 14-step, mini-pilgrimage recalling the journey of Our Lord to Calvary beginning with his condemnation and culminating with the laying of the body of the Lord in the tomb. Catholics are long familiar with this devotion. Since my ordination to the diaconate, I have been privileged to lead the congregation in praying the *Stations of the Cross* on many of the Fridays in Lent; personally, I find the devotion to be a profound form of prayer, allowing me (and hopefully others) to enter into a deep meditation on the great sacrifice of Our Lord Jesus Christ. The devotion lasts no longer than 30 minutes, but is a wonderful way to deepen our spiritual journey with the Lord as he enters into his Paschal Sacrifice.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

During the days and weeks of penance that lie ahead --- from *Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024,*



Church throughout the world commemorates the penitential season of Lent ending with the Sacred Triduum of Holy Week. The model Jesus gave us for "these forty days" was his own experience in the desert and the temptations that followed him there where he encountered Satan face to face. And yet, Jesus, there in the desert --- alone, fasting and in intense prayer --- beat back the devil and triumphed over temptation, as strong and as unrelenting as it was throughout those forty days.

We enter the desert of Lent like Jesus, led by the Holy Spirit, to face our devils, our temptations head on. But we are not alone. The Lord Jesus Christ is with us. And so, too, is the Church, the entire community of faith observing Lent. Here is what the Catholic Church in the United States requires of us as baptized Catholics:

1. The days of FAST (only one full meal) <u>and ABSTINENCE</u> (no meat) are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. No dispensations are granted on these solemn days except for reason of sickness or those provided in canon law below. ALL OTHER FRIDAYS OF LENT are days of ABSTINENCE.

The pastor of a parish has the faculty to give a dispensation to <u>individual</u> parishioners in his parish and the Diocesan Bishop alone has the authority to dispense groups of Catholics but only for a serious reason.

2. Those who are automatically dispensed from fast and abstinence regulations outside the age limits noted below include: the physically or mentally ill, especially individuals suffering from chronic ill-nesses such as diabetes. Also included in the dispensation are women who are pregnant or nursing. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to FAST (only one full meal) as above. From the age of 14, people are also obliged to ABSTAIN (no meat): this obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat).

The obligation to observe the laws of fast and abstinence is a serious one for Catholics. Failure to observe one penitential day in itself is not considered a serious sin. It is the intentional failure to observe any penitential days at all, or a substantial number of penitential days, that must be considered a serious matter.


The obligation, the privilege really, of receiving the Eucharist at least once a year --- often called "Easter duty" --- for those in the state of grace should still be fulfilled during the period from the **First Sunday of Lent, February 17-18, 2024, to Trinity Sunday, May 25-26, 2024.** However, the Church's law does permit this precept to be fulfilled at another time during the year when there is a just cause.

I want to encourage all Catholics, especially those who are conscious of serious sin, to go to confession and to make use of the sacrifices and traditions that have always been part of our Lenten practices in the Church.

We do, indeed, fast and pray with the Lord Jesus and with our fellow Catholics. May this Lent be a time of penance leading to grace and joy for us all at Easter.
